

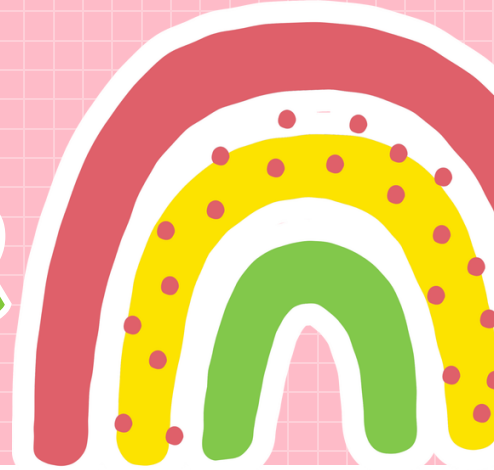

We are sure that your child will begin to share all their wonderful experiences as they feel more comfortable with his or her new classmates and teachers.

• Reading Time:

We'll read three heartwarming stories. First, A Pocket for Corduroy follows a bear's journey to find his missing pocket, teaching us about belonging. Then, Love is a Family shows that love comes in many forms, no matter the family. Finally, The Kissing Hand reassures us that love stays with us, even when we're apart. These books will help us explore themes of love, connection, and belonging.
